Course information

Course prerequisites

This course is not based on any other specific courses in public international law, but basic knowledge of public international law is helpful.

Participants should be prepared to participate in class. Bearing in mind the sensitive nature of the issues discussed, it is required that such participation is respectful at all times. Participants should be aware of the particular sensitivities the discussion of armed conflicts, mass atrocities, etc. in this course may evoke.

Learning objectives

Acquire basic knowledge about transitional justice (basics, different regional approaches, mechanisms - truth commissions, commissions of inquiry, etc. - with a focus on judicial mechanisms).

Learn about the particular challenges (including practical ones) to transitional justice.

Gain experience in debating issues of transitional justice.

Practice discussion and writing skills.

Course content

Transitional justice deals with the processes and mechanisms associated with a society's attempt to come to terms with a legacy of large-scale past conflict, repression, violations and abuses. Commonly known mechanisms are international criminal courts, truth commissions, etc. This course provides an overview of the main concepts (including regional differences) and mechanisms of transitional justice with a focus on judicial mechanisms. On the basis of theoretical concepts and case studies, participants are enabled to critically weigh the pros and cons of different mechanisms in particular settings and to suggest improvements. Where applicable, this course refers to other relevant areas of public international law and seeks to integrate participants' existing knowledge with the knowledge acquired in this course.

Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

- 1. Main concepts (What is transitional justice? How did it develop? Who is a victim? How do different regions deal with transitions? Etc.)
- 2. Mechanisms (truth commissions, commissions of inquiry, etc.)
- 3. Judicial mechanisms (International Criminal Court, Ad Hoc Tribunals, etc.), including the role of the local judiciary
